
Cowboy Ethics Training

National 4-H GIS/GPS Leadership Team

It's not too late to submit a team application for the National 4-H GIS/GPS leadership team. The National 4-H GIS/GPS leadership team is a national leadership opportunity for state 4-H youth-adult teams to support 4-H GIS and community mapping programs. Our leadership team is typically 20-40 teens and adults from 7-15 states. The team serves for one year beginning in June 2016.

As members of the leadership team, youth and adults will represent 4-H at the Esri Educational GIS Users Conference in June 24-28, 2016 in San Diego and participate in a GIS service project there; participate in team communications for the year and take an active role throughout the year on a team GIS project that supports 4-H GIS activities at national, state and local levels; and serve as geomentors for future 4-H GIS software grant recipients.

The national team is composed of state/LGU teams of one or two 4-H teens and one adult. Additional teams and members from a state/LGU may be accepted if there are positions available. States that wish to submit applications for more than one team need to rank them (first team, second team, etc.). A ratio of no more than two youth to one adult is required by the GIS conference. Youth must be 4-H members at least age 14 and not yet graduated from high school when the team attends the GIS conference in June.

Completed and digitally signed PDF applications must be submitted by Friday, Feb. 19, 2016. Download the fillable PDF application from https://sites.google.com/site/nat4hgis. E-mail the completed PDF document with digital signatures to both e-mail addresses shown on the last page of the application. Team applications will be reviewed and selections made in March.

AgDiscovery

AgDiscovery is a 2- to 4-week residential outreach program sponsored by different United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) programs for high school students in partnership with selected universities. Ag-Discovery is a unique opportunity for students to gain a first-hand look at the many career paths open to them in agriculture. The program allows students to live on a college campus and learn about different agriculture careers from university professors, scientists, and other professionals who work for the U.S. Government in a variety of fields. In 2016, there are 20 universities participating in AgDiscovery.

The program is targeted towards middle and high school students, who are interested in learning more about plants, animals, and agribusiness The students will visit a variety of private and university farms, zoological facilities, animal shelters, wildlife conservation areas and research facilities. Students chosen to participate in AgDiscovery will gain experience through hands-on labs, workshops, and field trips. They will also participate in a number of cultural awareness and teambuilding activities. Every activity is being planned to enhance the student's learning experience and provide countless hands-on opportunities which will be crucial to the student's enjoyment of the program.

Students selected for the 2016 AgDiscovery summer session will pay only the cost of their transportation to get from their home to the college campus for the start of the session and back again at the end of the session. The cost of tuition, room and board, and lab supplies for the program will be covered by various programs within APHIS.

Beekeeping has had its five minutes of fame for the past five years. Now more than ever, people are asking "What will happen if the bees are gone?" Your paper should research and answer this question.

Parliamentary Procedure Contest

The parliamentary procedure contest will be held on March 5th. It will start at 1:30 p.m. at the Fairgrounds. It usually last about 3 hours depending on the number of teams who wish to participate. If you are interested in participating please contact Jonathan at the Extension Office via email jvrabec@arapahoegov.com by **February 19**th (deadline extended). Rules for the contest will follow the state rules with the exception of a shorter time limit and a reduced number of new business problems and fewer motions to be handled. State contest rules can be found by clicking <u>HERE</u>

All clubs are encouraged to enter their officer teams and an adult leader to supervise. Participants will test their skills at running meetings and handling different situations. The contest also includes a written test based off the parliamentary procedure handbook, officers receive during officer training. This should be a great hand's on learning experience and a lot of fun. The top team will qualify for the state contest in June. If the top team is a mixed team of multiple aged members, high scoring senior members from the other teams can be used to fill the team going to state.

Teams are made up of four to six members they can be a mix of any age members. If your club has a small membership you may combine with another club in order to field a team. The contest will be made up of three parts. The demonstration portion of the contest is where the team has 15 minutes to demonstrate proper parliamentary procedure. They will be presented with two items of new business and four motions. Teams will have 15 minutes to review and prepare before presenting. The second part is a Written Test, which will emphasize knowledge of parliamentary procedure on the part of each member. Tests will be taken individually. The last portion of the contest will be the Oral Questions portion where each team member will be asked one 10-point question that will pertain to the motions they used during the demonstration. Enrollment News

Enrollment Deadlines

The re-enrollment deadline for returning members and leaders has passed.

New members still have time to get enrolled but the sooner new members are in the system and we have fees collected and paper work completed the better we are able to communicate and serve their needs. New members have until April 1st.

All members have until April 1st to add, make changes or drop projects providing project requirements can still be met. Members can do this themselves by logging into their 4honline account and making the needed changes. Any project a member is enrolled in after April 1st the member will be expected to complete that project.

Helpful Tips

It is amazing how much misinformation there is about 4-H, even among 4-H people. Club organizational leaders have asked some interesting questions, so don't ever be afraid to ask. We love it when someone asks clarifying questions about club operations, policies, procedures, events and opportunities. It's as easy as a phone call to 303-730-1920 or an email. So far we have not found a problem that we cannot help you with. That really is the mission of Extension, to help find answers, solve problems and to be the most reliable source for information.

Project Add/Drop

Do you need to change the projects you are enrolled in? Remember, you only have until **April 1 at 5:00pm to change your projects!** After that the system will lock and you must complete all projects that you are enrolled in. Completion includes **either** exhibiting the project at the county fair OR doing a demonstration on the project **and** satisfactorily submitting a completed record book. Add/Drop is done ELECTRONICALLY using 4honline. **There is no paperwork for Add/Drop and it cannot be done over the phone.** The Add/Drop instructions are at the very top of this website: http://www.extension.colostate.edu/arapahoe/4h/4h-enroll-changes.shtml If you have trouble with Add/Drop, please contact your club leader.



Reminders

Get Started on Your Record Book!

All members need to complete a Record Book (e-Record) for each project they are enrolled in. Some of these are due at fair, some of them are due after fair. Regardless, they take into account your entire year's work, so start working on them now! The e-Records are posted online at: http://www.colorado4h.org/project_resources/erecords/index.php

Important— any record book due after county fair (i.e. Animal Project e-records) please do not hand it in, in a 3 ring binder. Something like the picture below would be a great option. They help keep our record books easier to handle, store or transport as they go out to be graded. These are available from the extension office or through the 4-H mall online. Or you can pick something similar up at an office supply stores or anywhere they sell school supplies.

Record Books

One of the most important life skills 4-H can offer members is record keeping skills. That is why we require members to complete a record book for every project they are enrolled in. Our full record book policy is located in the 2015/2016 Policies for Success document posted on our website, and it is copied below. To find the record book you should be using, visit: http://www.colorado4h.org/project resources/erecords/index.php

Record Book Policy

- 1. Members must complete a record book for each project the member is enrolled in receiving a score of 70% or above.
- 2. Please be aware that some record books have a supplemental form that must also be submitted.
- 3. Record books for Family Consumer Science, Shooting Sports and General projects will be turned in at the County Fair with the member's exhibit (only if the member chooses to exhibit) otherwise they will be turned in to their project leader and graded prior to the last Friday in August.
- 4. Record books for Dog, Horse, Livestock and Small Animal projects are to be graded by the project or club leader prior to being turned in to the Extension office by **September 7th.**
- 5. The official Score sheet should be used when grading record books. Score sheets (rubrics) are posted on the COUNTY 4-H website and can usually be found on the project area pages.
- 6. SEE Animal Project Record Book Policies for more detail on animal record books. NOTE: In the event a member turns in an unsatisfactory record book, they should be given one week to revise their record book to reach a score of 70% or higher, prior to the final due date of the first Monday in September. If revisions are required, they will not be eligible for end of the year record book awards but will satisfy the completion requirement.

Leader News

Club/Organizational Leaders: Community Service

Don't forget all clubs should be doing some kind of community service project at some point during the 4-H year. Participation in a community service project is required as part of completion for 4-H members. This is a great time of year to start planning what that community service project for your club will be. By doing community service when the 4-H program is asked, what kind of impact it makes in a community we can not only point to the impact we make on the youth enrolled in the 4-H program but also the impact we make on the community. Both are vital to the future of the 4-H program. I would also like to clarify that a community service project is NOT a project for which the club gets paid unless those funds derived from the project are being donated to some other kind of charity. Cleaning-up a facility used by your club or project group is a community service projects but that is the contribution your club or group should make for the use of the facility and it should NOT be the only community service your group or club does. The 4-H program benefits from its use and the quality of the facilities. Community service projects should be things that benefit others and outside groups not our own program. It is our desire that all clubs should be doing other community service projects at the club level in-addition to any organized through the overall 4-H program. Projects we do or have organized as part of the 4-H program that benefit the 4-H program are things we should all pitch in and do anyway to help make the program which we all participate in better and/or the facilities we use better. Those types of things should be done in-addition to your community service projects because it is the right thing to do! When selecting a community service project for you club try and select one that is not self-serving but rather one that benefits the community or a segment of the community/county. Clubs should select their Community Service Projects as a group and work on them as a group so as to make a more noticeable impact. If individuals or project groups want to do a community service project that is also related to their project they are welcome to do that as well. If clubs are in need of ideas for community service projects we usually have things come our way through the year. You are welcome to contact us and we can assist you in finding a project.



Livestock Prospect and Jackpot Shows

As I receive information on these shows I will be posting them on the Livestock project page of the web site please check back as I will be updating it once a week. Please contact organizers of these shows directly for more information as the posted information will be all we have.

Leased Livestock Procedures

4-Hers may only lease two animals for project areas which they do not already own. For example, if you already own dairy goats you may not lease a dairy goat but if you own dairy goats and would also like to try fiber goats you are allowed to lease a fiber goat. Also, a standardized universal lease form has been developed that will require the animal's tattoo or ear tag number listed on it. This lease form is universal so anyone leasing an animal will need to use this form and **have it on file at the Extension Office by April 1st** (to coincide with the add/drop date) If you have additional requirements specified by the person who is leasing out an animal, you should add that information as a separate sheet, but this "universal" form must be filled out if leasing an animal for 4-H. These projects ideally should begin in October and go through September since only breeding animals can be leased. Leases are not permitted on market livestock.

4-H Livestock Advisory Committee

The Arapahoe County Livestock Advisory Committee will meet again on Feb 16th at 7 p.m. at O'Malley's. The group reviewed the schedule of events for the 2016 County Fair and are working on Fair Book revisions. We will highlight those in our next newsletter. We are currently seeking someone to take over as Poultry Superintendent in 2016. 4-H Sheep Project Supplemental Meetings

Tuesday March 8th 7:00 p.m. -8:30 p.m. Arapahoe County Fairgrounds Classrooms

Members interested in doing or already enrolled in the 4-H Sheep Projects from any club are welcome to attend. These sessions will supplement your club project meetings or if your club doesn't have a sheep project leader they can serve as your project meetings. This is the third session, it will cover facilities and animal health/diseases. Dr Jodie Vetter will be presenting the health and disease portion. This should give the members the information they need to be prepared to prevent and treat most common health issues. I hope you will join us for the second session. Meat Quality Assurance

MQA training is required for anyone new to 4-H (which includes juniors (8-10) as well as first year intermediates age group (11-13) and first year seniors (14-18) if they are taking **cattle**, **dairy**, **hogs**, **goats**, **sheep**, **rabbits**, **or poultry you must attend a meat quality assurance workshop**. Regardless of whether it is a market project or a breeding project you must attend a Meat Quality Assurance workshop. **4-H'ers who are 13 and under must have a parent stay at the MQA with them.** The remaining MQA Workshop in Arapahoe County will be on April 7th at the new CSU Extension Office starting at 6:45 p.m. This one is lecture based, therefore participants need to be there at the start. It will last about 2 hours and you must attend the entire program. Remember that if you are not able to attend a MQA Workshop in Arapahoe County you are welcome to attend MQA Workshops in other counties. Those counties will mail your certification to our office to show that you attended. However, Meat Quality Assurance certification must be completed 45 days prior to our County Fair. It is best to get this requirement accomplished early to avoid any unforeseen conflicts.

Pork Quality Assurance (Swine Project Members only: Both Market and Breeding)

PQA certification is accomplished by first attending an MQA training initially. Attending an MQA training certifies a member for PQA for one year. PQA certification can then be renewed in two ways:

- 1. By attending another MQA training which will provide certification again for one year.
- 2. By the youth coming to the Extension Office (or making other arrangements with the Agent) and taking a written test. They must pass the test with at least a 70%. If they do not pass with a 70% they may attempt to test twice more. If the three tests yield unsuccessful results, the youth must attend an MQA class prior to being recertified. Tests will be graded once a week and you will be notified of the results.

Again, testing is only for those needing to renew their PQA certification. All initial PQA certifications are accomplished by attending an MQA workshop.

Tag-in

Tag-in for Market Beef will be held on March 5th

Tag-in for market sheep, goats and swine will be on April 30th so mark your calendars now!

BEEF Tag-In

Beef Weigh-In will be held March 5, 9:00 a.m.-11:30 a.m. at the Arapahoe County Fairgrounds. (Emergency date to be announced and will only to be used if you are notified of a cancellation) **Things to know before coming to Weigh-In:**

- You must bring your animal with a halter already on before it will be unloaded, or it will not be weighed. Any uncontrollable animals will NOT be weighed!!!! The idea is to work with them ahead of time!!!
- Please have your calves brand inspected prior to coming to weigh-in. Do not forget to bring your brand inspection papers.

REMEMBER ALL ANIMALS MUST BE CASTRATED PRIOR TO BEING WEIGHED IN AND TAGGED AS A 4-H MARKET PROJECT. CASTRATION MUST BE DONE PRIOR TO ARRIVING AT THE FAIRGROUNDS (NOT THE DAY OF WEIGH-IN) AND HEALED AS MUCH AS POSSIBLE! ALL CATTLE AND MARKET GOATS MUST BE DEHORNED.

State Fair Nomination Cards and Premise ID's

Remember all 4-H and FFA exhibitors must have their premise ID# on their nomination cards to be accepted for State Fair. This is a State Fair Policy NOT a requirement to participate in the local 4-H program. This information should be completed on ALL cards at the time of weigh-in. You will need to apply for your premise ID number well in advance of weigh-in so they have time to assign you one. Please do so 3-4 weeks before you need it. Please call 303-869-9000 to get your ID or apply online at www.coanimalid.org.

Producer Classes

What is a producer class? It's a market or breeding class for those of you who raise and show your own animals. Individuals who breed and raise their own show animals will show against one another. This class is in addition to the regular classes (Market and Breeding). In order to participate in the producer classes you must be signed up for the corresponding breeding project. Producer's Market Class Animals must be tagged in at the Tag-in for that species under the name of the producer. They must also make weight as well as abide by all other regulations in regards to showing of 4-H market animals. Proof of ownership of the dam must be established and certified by the superintendent prior to show. This can be accomplished by either a Bill of Sale OR a Letter from the 4-H Livestock leader OR a herd inspection by the superintendent. It is NOT required that the dam/sire of producer animals be shown at a previous County fair.

Sheep, Swine and Goat Tag-In - April 30th


Saturday April 30th, Arapahoe County Fairgrounds

All market animals must attend to be eligible to be shown at County Fair. Animals must be owned by tag-in. All species must be castrated and healed as much as possible prior to tag-in.

Market Hogs - 9 – 11:30 a.m. (Note: Due to biosecurity concerns, if you do not absolutely need a weight on your hog, weighing it at Tag-In is not suggested. However, if you wish to weigh your hog, you may get it tagged and weighed from 11:30 a.m. - noon, rather than arriving earlier.) All hogs must be ear-notched prior to tagging for State Fair. Members or family members should come prepared to do their own tagging. We will have taggers available for your use but due to biosecurity precautions we would like to avoid having people enter multiple trailers. Same procedure as last year.

Market Lambs - 9 - 10:30 a.m. (Note: All market lambs must be retinal scanned. Weighing of lambs at tag-in is optional.)

Market Goats - 10:30 - 11:30 a.m. (Note: (Note: All market goats must be retinal scanned. All market goats must be dehorned or tipped. Weighing of goats at tag-in is optional.) If you are also tagging in one of the other species being tagged in that day you may bring your goats along and tag-in at the time.
