



AG CORNER: NOXIOUS WEEDS & APPLICATOR CERTFICIATION INFORMATION

Weeds can be problematic not only for those in agricultural production, but the average homeowner as well. Weeds choke out desired plants, extract large amounts of water from the soil in some cases, can be

poisonous or dangerous to animal's health, ruin crops, and leave behind seeds that can be harmful as well such as burs, and more. A weed quite simply is a *"plant growing where it is not wanted and in competition with cultivated or other desired plants."* A weed could be volunteer wheat growing in a corn field or wild peas growing in the tulip patch. However, through classification in most states, many weeds are placed on a scale of those to "watch" and work on preventing growth to those that must be "eradicated" and are a high priority. Some weeds cause very minor damage and are easily removed, while others can ruin crops or grasslands or take over yards and can be extremely hard to control and eradicate. Weeds tend to be



vary hardy and can live in undesirable conditions or even have seeds that "hibernate" until more favorable soil conditions emerge (i.e. wetter than usual spring).

In Colorado there are four list designations for noxious weeds:

List A (Weed Species)-Designated for eradication.

List B (Weed Species)-Weeds for which a noxious weed management plan has been developed and implemented to stop the continued spread of the species.

List C (Weed Species)- Weeds for which plans are developed to help provide education, research, and biological control of the species for those jurisdictions which choose to work on control.

Watch List (Weed Species)- Those that pose a potential threat to agricultural production and environment in the state.

AG CORNER: NOXIOUS WEEDS & APPLICATOR CERTI-FICATION INFORMATION (Cont.)

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Control of weeds can include many forms including:

-Manual=This can include individual plant digging, mowing, tillage, planting cover crops, etc. to control weed populations.

-Biological Control= Agents including insects or animals that help to control or mitigate a weed population.

-Chemical= Use of a product to control or kill a weed species through chemical/cellular interaction.

Spraying weeds is a common method of control for many weeds, but often requires certification for the use of "restricted" products. Restricted products are those that are deemed to required additional training and oversight of product use to prevent overuse/misuse because of the potential environmental/ human/animal impact. There are two types of applicator certifications available in general. Private certification is for those that wish to use restricted use products for personal/private business use. Commercial certification is for those individuals or businesses who wish to apply restricted use products for other individuals or businesses. This would include the farmer who does spraying on his neighbors land in exchange for use of the neighbor's combine. 

Safety Data Sheets (SDS) (Formerly Material Safety Data Sheets-MSDS)-Are required of product manufacturers, distributors, or importers to communicate the hazards of chemical products. Safety data sheets are different than the product "label" which contains general information. A general search or going directly to a company's website or calling their designated number will allow you to find the SDS's for products.

PROJECT RECORD BOOKS: PART 3

State Fair Exhibit Requirements: co4h.colostate.edu/program-areas/state-fair-information/

Pictures:

-Each record book needs a minimum of four pictures of your actual current year 4-H project.

-A descriptive caption should be included with each picture to tell the judges what you are doing, what is being learned, and when the picture was taken.

-Pictures should be taken throughout the project to show progress from the beginning to the end.

Animal Purchase Record & Inventory:

-Only animals owned at the start of a project should be listed in beginning animal inventory.

-Ending animal inventory should only consist of animals still owned/alive at the end of the project.

-Ensure the Animal ID includes the species, animal sex, and tag # or other ID.

-Fill out all required animal breeding supplements according to the instructions.

Health Record & Expenses:

-Supplements and medicated feed should be listed with feed expense records.

-The health record items purchased should be listed under health expenses even if there was no direct cost (i.e. you traded labor for 3cc of de-wormer for your goat). Put health item, paid to relative (labor trade), cost \$0.00. This will accurately depict what health items you provided for your animals.

-Read the instructions carefully as health records do include cleaning pens, clipping, hoof trimming, etc.

-You must properly fill out each column including medication lot numbers and expiration dates.

-Use proper names (i.e. John Smith) of individuals: not mom, dad, grandma, brother, etc.

Heart– Spring has come and trees and flowers are beginning to bloom. It also means that the grass and weeds in your yards and back alley areas are also beginning to grow. The spring is a great time to do some general yard clean up and get rid of any dead plant material. There are many individuals who own homes, but may not be able to complete the job themselves including: elderly, living alone, have some physical limitations, or just a very large yard. Volunteering to help clean up someone's yard or loan equipment is a great way to add community service hours to your resume and do something for others.

Health– Spring means that animals are more active as they come out of hibernation and move to other habitat areas. This movement causes an increased interaction between wild animals and humans/ livestock. This also means that there is a great likelihood for contraction of rabies. It's important to remember the following tips in the spring:

- -Avoid contact with wild animals.
- -If you suspect a livestock animal has been bitten; quarantine the animal, notify your veterinarian and local Colorado Department of Agriculture.
- -Properly dispose of dead animals and do not touch them with bare hands.
- -If you are bitten go to your nearest medical facility for treatment.
